Each Scalabrinian community is a small beacon that lights the darkness of migratory routes. Their quiet witness is often the only solace for those torn from their roots. They are not merely providers of social services but missionaries of the Gospel, called to recognize in the faces of migrants and refugees

the face of Christ Himself.

May this jubilee celebration renew in every sister, candidate, lay Scalabrinian, and volunteer the missionary ardor, the joy of service, the strength of faith, and the courage to persevere. May it inspire young people to answer God's call to this beautiful and timely vocation. And

may we all, as a Church, become more sensitive to the plight of migrants and refugees, ready to build bridges rather than walls.

May Mary, Mother of Migrants, intercede for this work and guide it with maternal tenderness on the paths of the Kingdom. And may Saint Charles Borromeo, patron of the Congregation, and Saint John Baptist Scalabrini intercede for all the sisters, candidates, lay people, and Scalabrinian volunteers, so that we may remain steadfast in faith, joyful in hope, and generous in love.
